| Project Summary                 | Soldiers Beach is one of the few Central Coast beaches untouched by urban development. The modern clubhouse facility was built in 2011 and is a popular venue for the local community.  Given the isolated location, away from the nearby residential area of  |
|                                 | Norah Head, the club is situated in a blackspot area with very limited mobile coverage and NBN access.   |
|                                 | Poor connectivity has negative implications for our volunteer lifesavers, such as limiting access to online weather/surf reports to issue timely warnings to beachgoers. Also, recording of patrol statistics and other administrative functions requires adequate online access. In an emergency situation, weak mobile coverage on the beach could potentially place the community at risk.                          |
|                                 | Training capabilities are also impacted as lifesavers require extensive and regular training to maintain existing skills and learn new techniques. Much of the 'off beach' training is offered in an online format. Failure to offer quality training can impact our volunteer recruitment and retention ability, particularly with our youth members. In order to retain the valuable youth membership base, relevant |
|                                 | activities and challenges are required and the current lack of WiFi is proving a deterrent for youth to become involved and spend their extracurricular time at the club.  |
|                                 | The 'WifiSurf' project aims to deploy high quality, wireless infrastructure throughout the clubhouse, and to the shark and observation tower. In the future the aim is to increase coverage over the beach to expand the surf lifesaving services.   |

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| Project Summary   | Davistown Progress Hall is a community-owned hall, and is a much loved pretty little hall located on the waterfront at historic Davistown. It is at this location where colonial ship building began along the foreshore near the hall, before extending to Bensville and Kincumber, and then on to Blackwall. Local ship building maps show Davistown as having more ship building sites than any other in Brisbane Water. Captain Arthur Philip had earlier passed by Davistown, in search of good agricultural land not that long after the first fleet landed. The progress hall was built in 1921 and has been in continuous use by the community to this day. Davistown residents will enjoy celebrating their halls centenary year in just five years' time. Funding for the project will enable a number of upgrades including a fire door, emergency lighting, whirly birds and drainage. The upgrades will bring it to a more appropriate state to continue as a safe and healthy venue for the community.  |

| Project Summary   | This project is the creation of the East Gosford Community Garden within Newman Park. Driven by Rotary members, locals will be encouraged to visit and participate in a variety of activities in the garden. From planting, tending and harvesting the vegetables, fruits and flowers, to relaxing and enjoying the garden as a place for reflection and relaxation.  Installation of raised garden beds and wheelchair friendly paths enables people with disabilities and the elderly to garden side by side with other community members. To foster social interaction and include non-gardeners, there will be park benches positioned under existing shade trees and water tanks to ensure our gardens will prosper all year.  The garden will be a place of activity and relaxation and a place for organised group visits. School groups will be invited to visit and learn about growing vegetables. Aged care facilities can attend on a regular or one off basis to enjoy time in the garden. Many residents of these facilities have been keen gardeners and no longer have access to gardening. They can plant seedlings, pick flowers or just get their hands dirty in the garden.  This garden will be a true community space, designed for all ages and abilities, fulfilling a need for people living without their own garden and a place to teach and learn about the food we eat. All produce grown will be made available to our 'gardeners'. |

| Project Summary   | This program aims to provide people over the age of 65 years residing on the Central Coast with access to peer-based mental health recovery services.   |
|                   | The Australian National Framework for Recovery Orientated Mental Health Services describes peer work as a core strategy in promoting recovery for people with a lived experience of mental illness. A peer worker in the mental health setting is defined as a person with a lived experience of mental illness who offers help, based on understanding, respect and mutual empowerment to people in similar situations. The project is unique in that it will be designed, delivered and evaluated by older people in partnership with Central Coast Primary Care (CCPC), Partners in Recovery (PIR) and Specialist Mental Health Services for |

|                   | Older People (SMHSOP) and is the first peer based program to specifically meet the recovery needs of older people.   |
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|                   | The Central Coast population is ageing with the greatest age group increase being in people over 70 years. Enhancements to services that support and keep older people active, healthy and in their homes should be a priority and represents significant gaps in service.   |
|                   | Older Peer workers will provide a range of recovery based services to older people including:  |
|                   | 1. Individual sessions with older people which focus on individualised recovery plans and activities.  |

| Project Summary   | Each year, over 1,500 year 11 students from the Central Coast area attend RYDA Central Coast at Wyong Racecourse. RYDA is a series of practical and powerful workshops that aim to change the way young people think about road safety. As part of an interactive one-day experience, students experience braking at different speeds, devise travel strategies that will work for them in the real world and get tips from road safety experts on how to protect themselves, their friends and family. Perhaps the most impactful moments come from the personal stories of loss and survival.  The combined clubs of Rotary on the Central Coast are our community partner to provide this event with volunteers, combining with NSW Police Schools Liaison officers, speakers from the Central Coast Disability Network and train facilitators. Of the 13 schools in Wyong LGA, seven are already regular attendees as well as Job Centre Australia-Wyong, Oasis Youth Centre and Breakthru in Wyong. With further support we can keep the costs as low as possible, and even provide additional subsidies (such as for buses) to enable students and schools to spread the important message of safety to young people on the Central Coast. |

|                   | Meal preparation resources, personal hygiene items, kitchen safety items etc. to facilitate lessons in health, nutritional and self-care skills.   |
|                   | - Technology for Digital Literacy:   |
|                   | Computers with educational software installed to develop digital literacy for school and workplace settings, as well as skills for independence (e.g. online banking, cyber safety, internet research).  |
|                   | - Furniture for Teaching and Learning:   |
|                   | Desks, chairs and other furniture essentials for day-to-day learning and teaching needs.   |
|                   | The Lakes College will support 15-20 students with complex needs per year, with the first student intake commencing in the school Term 1, 2017.  |
|                   | The resources will enable Central Coast youth in crisis to receive the specialised support they need to overcome their challenging circumstances, complete their high school education and transition into productive post-school employment and learning pathways and continue to benefit disadvantaged Central Coast youth beyond the project period, with an extended lifespan of 5-10 years. |
